Ports of Call / Destinations	Update
Antigua and Barbuda	<p>V.C. Bird International Airport is open for international and regional air traffic. During this time, protocols will be implemented, including requiring all passengers to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Have a negative COVID-19 RT-PCR (real time polymerase chain reaction) taken within seven days of their flight • Wear a face mask on disembarkation and in all public areas; the wearing of face mask in public spaces is mandatory throughout Antigua and Barbuda and social/physical distancing protocols must be adhered to • Complete a Health Declaration Form and be subjected to screening and temperature checks by Port Health Authorities upon arrival in Antigua and Barbuda
Bahamas (Nassau)	<p>The Bahamas is closed to visitors from the United States.</p> <p>The country reopened its borders, airports, and seaports on July 1, according to the Bahamas Ministry of Tourism and Aviation. Extensive health and safety protocols, part of a new Tourism Readiness and Recovery Plan, will be enforced to mitigate risks for all visitors and residents, according to Joy Jibrilu, Director General.</p> <p>Visitors from Canada, the United Kingdom, and Europe will be welcome, assuming the following guidelines are followed. Prior to arrival, travelers are required to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Complete an electronic Health Visa on travel.gov.bs • Have taken a COVID-19 PRC Swab Test within 10 days of travel date and received a negative result; test must be present upon arrival <p>Hotels opened for the arrival of guests on July 1 with limited operations. Face masks will be required in public, and temperature screenings will be conducted daily.</p>
Barbados (Bridgetown)	<p>Will reopen its borders to international travelers with limited flights on July 12, and to U.S. travelers on July 25.</p> <p>Prior to arrival, travelers should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Take a COVID-19 PRC test from an accredited laboratory within 72 hours of departure if traveling from a high-risk country • Take a COVID-19 test within a week of departure if traveling from a low-risk country • Undergo a health assessment, which may include a temperature check and a brief interview by Port Health personnel
Belize (Belize City)	<p>The Philip S. W. Goldson International Airport will be open on August 15, 2020. Seaports in Belize are closed to non-essential traffic at this time. When the airport reopens, hotels will be opened in a phased approach.</p> <p>Prior to travel, be sure to download the Belize Health app and complete the required</p>

	information before boarding your flight to Belize. If travelers present a COVID-19 test taken within 72 hours prior to travel, they will be able to fast track the entry lane for quicker processing.
Bermuda (Hamilton, King's Wharf, St. George)	<p>Reopened to travelers arriving by air on July 1, 2020. The cruise port is still closed.</p> <p>Prior to arrival, travelers are required to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Obtain a certified negative PRC COVID-19 test within 72 hours of departure • Ensure they have appropriate health insurance • Wear face masks when travelling to the departure airport and practice physical distancing • Complete a traveler screening form and arrival card
BVI (Tortola)	The phased and controlled reopening of borders, particularly at the Terrence B. Lettsome International Airport, began on June 2. Under this phase, only nationals, holders of permanent residence, and naturalized citizens of the Virgin Islands are allowed entry into the Territory. Non-residents are not expected to be permitted to visit until September 1.
Cayman Island (Grand Cayman)	Closed to tourists until at least September 1. This affects ships scheduled to call on Grand Cayman.
Curaçao (Willemstad)	<p>Until further notice, the Curaçao International Airport is closed to all inbound passengers from most countries, including the U.S.</p> <p>All embarked ships that want to lay-up, must stay in quarantine for 2 weeks under strict supervision.</p>
Dominica (Roseau)	A tentative date of July 15 has been set for nationals and residents, and August 7 for non-nationals to be welcomed back to the island. Pre-arrival requirements, as well as ports of entry criteria, will be communicated to travelers to ensure they're aware of the expectations for travel to Dominica.
Dominican Republic (Puerto Plata)	Hotels, beaches, and restaurants began reopening on June 17. International airports throughout are closed to commercial traffic until July 1, according to the Dominican Institute of Civil Aviation.
Grenada (St. George's)	The country, which had planned to reopen its borders to commercial international traffic on July 1, has announced a more cautious approach. Officials continue to work on protocols before the country begins to accept commercial flights, according to Prime Minister Dr. Keith Mitchell.
Honduras (Roatan)	Borders to international travel are expected to reopen July 15.
Jamaica (Montego)	Borders reopened to international travelers on June 15. Arriving passengers are required to

Bay, Ocho Rios)	<p>complete and submit pre-arrival authorization that asks about possible exposure to COVID-19. Travelers from some U.S. states, including Florida, Texas, and New York, must upload results of a negative COVID-19 test.</p> <p>Screenings will include electronic thermal scans. Face masks and social distancing in public spaces will be required of all persons, including visitors. This includes points of entry, ground transportation, and accommodation facilities. Within the next two weeks, Jamaica will review whether to reopen public beaches, water attractions, and amusement parks.</p> <p>For more information Click Here</p> <p>Jamaica Travel Authorization Click Here</p>
Mexico (Cozumel, Costa Maya, Puerto Vallarta)	<p>Borders currently closed to all international travelers arriving by cruise ship.</p> <p>Cancun has been given the green light to open their resorts and hotels beginning June 8. Not all resorts and hotels are opening immediately, but most will be online by July 1.</p>
Puerto Rico (San Juan)	<p>Airports, hotels, and restaurants will reopen to in-bound tourism on July 15.</p> <p>Arriving passengers must complete a travel declaration from the Puerto Rico Health Department and show proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken 72 hours before departure. If travelers arrive without the test, they will be tested at the airport and must quarantine for 14 days or until a negative result is obtained.</p>
St. Kitts (Basseterre)	<p>Borders are currently closed.</p>
St. Lucia (Castries)	<p>Borders are open to all international carriers and to visitors carrying all passports.</p> <p>St. Lucia requires proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken within seven days of travel, completion of a pre-arrival registration form, temperature checks are taken upon arrival, and face masks worn in public from arrival through departure.</p> <p>In phase one, which runs to July 31, no sites or attractions are open, although some shops are. A number of restaurants are open for delivery and takeout services, but none offer seated service.</p>
St. Maarten (Philipsburg)	<p>Visitors from the US, Canada, and Europe will be welcomed back beginning July 1. Testing and temperature checks will be required upon arrival.</p>
St. Thomas (Charlotte Amalie)	<p>All restrictions against leisure travel are no longer in place.</p> <p>To ensure the safety and well-being of visitors and residents, entry requirements will be in place for visitors to enter St. Maarten along with other safety measures at the Princess Juliana International Airport. Passengers are required to take a COVID-19 RT-PCR test, with proof of negative results no older than 72 hours prior to day of travel.</p>
Turks & Caicos	<p>Starting July 22, 2020, all travelers (visitors/tourists and residents) will be required to visit the</p>

(Grand Turk)	TCI Assured Travel Authorization Portal in order to obtain a travel authorization for arrival in the Turks and Caicos Islands.
U.S. Virgin Islands	Open to visitors as of June 1. New health and safety protocols for all tourism stakeholders have been rolled out in conjunction with the Department of Health and guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Ports remain temporarily closed to cruise ships. Travelers are required to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Wear a facial covering upon terminal disembarkation • Undergo screening procedures and temperature check
USA (Key West)	Open to visitors. The city of Key West will not have cruises ships docking for the foreseeable future. Facial coverings are required to be worn by everyone in business establishments and other public settings where there is no roof overhead.
